

Leave no child behind Launch of the global report on boys' disengagement from education

Background

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development makes the promise to leave no one behind. While improving educational opportunities for girls globally continues to be of paramount importance to achieve gender equality in and through education, this focus on achieving gender parity and equality must not ignore boys. Ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all – Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4 – and achieving gender equality and empowering all women and girls – SDG 5 – requires gender-transformative action.

Addressing boys' disengagement from and disadvantage in education not only benefits boys' learning, employment opportunities, income and well-being, it is also highly beneficial for achieving gender equality and desirable economic, social and health outcomes. The social and fiscal costs of this phenomenon are enormous, underlining the need for a broad, inclusive approach to education, ensuring educational opportunity for both girls and boys.

To leave no child behind, UNESCO developed the first global report of this scope on boys' disengagement from and disadvantage in education, bringing together qualitative and quantitative evidence from over 140 countries.

As the report shows, in many countries, boys are at greater risk than girls of repeating grades, failing to complete different education levels and having poorer learning outcomes in school. Where previously boys' disadvantage seemed most notable in high- or upper-middle-income contexts at the beginning of the millennium, this has shifted and now includes several low- and lower-middle-income countries. Secondary education is where boys' disadvantage is most prevalent.

Objectives

This event, organized by UNESCO in partnership with Promundo and The Commonwealth Secretariat will:

- Launch the first global report of this scope on boys' disengagement from education, providing an overview on the global situation on boys' disengagement from and disadvantage in education, presenting factors influencing boys' participation, progression and learning outcomes in education and presenting recommendations to address the challenge.
- Present regional perspectives and evidence from country-level research on boys' disengagement from education.
- Showcase policy responses as well as good and promising practice to re-engage boys with education and address disadvantage.

Format and Language

This webinar, convening different stakeholders and the broader public online will include simultaneous interpretation in English, French and Spanish.

Gary Barker



Gary Barker is a leading global voice in advancing gender equality and positive masculinities. He is the CEO and co-founder of Promundo-US, and co-founder of Instituto Promundo in Brazil, having also founded MenCare, a global campaign working in more than 50 countries to promote men's involvement as caregivers, and MenEngage, a global alliance of more than 700 NGOs. Gary co-created and leads the International Men and Gender Equality Survey (IMAGES), the largest-ever survey of men's attitudes and behaviours related to violence, fatherhood, and gender equality. In 2017, he was named by Apolitical as one of the 20 most influential people in gender policy around the world.

Stefania Giannini



Stefania Giannini has served as Assistant Director-General for Education for UNESCO since 2018 and also serves as Advisor to the European Commissioner for Research and Innovation. She served in the Senate of the Republic of Italy from 2013-18 and as the country's Minister of Education, Universities and Research from 2014-16. She began her career as a professor of linguistics and was Rector of the University for Foreigners of Perugia from 2004-12. Ms Giannini been a member of prominent organizations including the Selection Committee of the Erasmus Mundus programme in Brussels, the Committee of The Conference of Italian University Rectors and the National Commission for the Promotion of Italian Culture Abroad at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Catherine Jere



Catherine Jere is an Associate Professor in Education and International Development, at the University of East Anglia (UEA)'s School of International Development. Her research interests centre on exploring how institutional and social barriers to education in developing country contexts are challenged and disrupted with a focus on gender and education. Before joining UEA, she was researcher with UNESCO's Global Education Monitoring Report and spent almost a decade with the Centre for Educational Research and Training (CERT) at the University of Malawi, as Research Fellow and Deputy Director. She has recently led a large-scale study for UNESCO on boys' disengagement from education.

Raj Kumar



Raj Kumar is the founding President & Editor-in-Chief of Devex, the media platform for the global development community. Devex was born in 2000 when Raj was a graduate student at the Harvard Kennedy School. Today, it is an independent news organization and social enterprise with over 100+ Devexers around the world serving a global audience of more than one million aid workers and development professionals. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, the Save the Children Board of Trustees, a media leader and former humanitarian council chair for the World Economic Forum, and has interviewed on-camera and on-stage hundreds of global luminaries on the most important challenges of our time. Raj is the author of the book "The Business of Changing the World," a go-to primer on the ideas, people, and technology disrupting the aid industry.

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Maki Katsuno-Hayashikawa



Maki Katsuno-Hayashikawa is the Director of the Division for Education 2030 at UNESCO Headquarters. Maki has extensive experiences of over 25 years with UNESCO, UNICEF and JICA, in managing global, regional and country level programmes on inclusive education, gender and education, early childhood care and education, learning assessment and teacher education as well as coordinating partnerships in education. Currently, she oversees UNESCO's global programmes on Gender and Inclusive Education, Higher Education, Education in Emergencies and leads the reform of the global SDG4 coordination mechanism.

Yona Nestel is global public education and gender equality advocate and expert who believes in the power of education to challenge and dismantle systems of oppression. Through her work as Plan International's global Inclusive, Quality Education Lead and as a board member of the Global Partnership for Education representing northern civil society, Yona helps turn rhetoric on the transformative power of education into action and impact.
